WELCOME FROM

THE HONORARY CHAIR

It's an honor to be the honorary chair of the Flying Horse Outdoor Sculpture Exhibit!

I have been drawn to large-scale physical sculpture and, subsequently, outdoor sculpture, since my early twenties. There is something about approaching a new piece in the outdoors that gives a sense of adventure, excitement, and discovery. One views the work from afar first, or it becomes perceptible when it wasn't before. You see not just the piece, but how it sits in the landscape, how it interacts with its environment. It is an object (or space or installation) to be encountered, observed, investigated. Sometimes one is startled or excited; sometimes an apprehension of beauty surges forth. One can also be perplexed, annoyed, bored. But one can look again, walk around it, come back to it, view it from a distance. New developments and perceptions can occur. The combination of walking through nature and hunting for art raises one's awareness, sharpening the senses; it takes one out of audience mode into active participant.

For the artist, outdoor exhibitions often have a generosity and openness that gallery shows exclude. There are more opportunities and ways for young or new artists to develop. Siting work outdoors has unique challenges: to create a piece that is not diminished by the great outdoors, and especially to withstand (or change intentionally) with time and tide. As an artist, learning to cope with, and even thrive with these challenges, can inspire expansive growth. Finally, public sculpture is often viewed by the casual passersby and even by accident, not just by those who seek out art in a gallery or museum. In this case, students and affiliates of the school will experience many sculptures through changes of season, and live with those in the collection over the years. I applaud Judith Klein and the Pingree School's work in continuing this exhibition and expanding the collection of outdoor art for the public to experience.

DAVID ADILMAN

David Adilman is an Andover, MA-based sculptor working primarily in stone, sometimes clay and cast resin or bronze. He creates both figurative and abstract work. His figurative work is aimed at evoking an emotional reaction. His abstract work seeks to find pleasing forms that are exciting to see at first glance and meant to be touched. David has been creating sculpture for more than 20 years, has displayed work in dozens of shows and has sculptures in numerous public settings throughout New England and in private collections. David is a practicing geologist with an informal sculpture education through many workshops and symposia nationwide. David is a member of the New England Sculpture Association and especially enjoys collaborating on projects with other artists.

ADRIA ARCH

Adria Arch's human-scaled constructions suggest wildly unreal figures or personas. The stacked and carved styrofoam rectangles stand in for legs, torsos and heads. *The Visitors* series represents Arch's first foray into standing sculpture. She was "delighted to discover that she could stack these modular forms as high as she could, as if they were kids' toys."

Arch has had solo exhibitions at Danforth Art in Framingham, MA, the Art Complex Museum in Duxbury, MA, and the Hunt Gallery at Mary Baldwin College in Virginia. She has completed site specific murals at Lesley University's Porter Square building in Cambridge, MA; Stonehill College; and Danforth Art in Framingham, MA. Arch has been awarded several residencies and her work is included in many private and public collections including the DeCordova Sculpture Park and Museum, Fidelity Corporation, and the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston.

TAYLOR APOSTOL AND EVAN MORSE

Taylor Apostol and Evan Morse met while studying abroad in Florence, with a shared passion for sculpture. They later returned to Italy, this time to Carrara, to study traditional sculpture techniques, including stone-carving. They are both MFA graduates of Boston University. While they each maintain separate studio practices, they have worked together on several commissioned projects including three marble monuments installed in the city of Rutland, Vermont. In 2023, they were accepted as a team to a 3-month residency in Manchester, NH, where they were inspired to create *Manchester Pathway* with textures from Manchester's industrial past sculpted in relief to create a series of cast concrete pavers. Apostol and Morse currently reside in Newton, MA.

Manchester Pathway is made up of separate concrete pavers, each about $18 \times 16 \times 2.5$ inches in dimension. The installation for the Pingree School includes 12–16 pavers arranged in a slightly different manner than shown in the photos. The arrangement can be adapted to suit the location. The pavers can be installed directly on the ground or inset into the ground. The simplest solution may be to have them in a mulched area where they can be dug gently into the mulch. That way, no grass need be disrupted and they can be stationed securely.

BAYDA ASBRIDGE

Bayda Asbridge is a multi-disciplinary artist who works in a wide range of mediums, including Asian brush painting, painting, drawing, photography, printmaking, Japanese weaving (Saori), mixed media, sculpture, installation, and basketry. Her work has been recognized in several New England art institutions.

In 2011, Asbridge was awarded the Frances Kinnicutt Travel & Study Award from Worcester Art Museum which allowed her to travel to England and study mixed media. In 2021, she was awarded the Mass Cultural Traditional Arts Award in Arabic Calligraphy and was trained in Arabic Diwani font. More recently,

in 2023, Asbridge was awarded the individual artist grant from Mass Cultural Council which she utilized to learn traditional and modern fiber and wire basketry weaving.

Asbridge runs art classes and workshops at Worcester Art Museum, the Worcester Craft Center, Snow Farm New England Craft, and many other local education institutions in MA.

FRFFDOM BAIRD

Freedom Baird creates spaces in which visitors can explore, question, and reflect as a way to expand awareness and cultivate agency. Baird works in multiple disciplines, including sculpture, installation, and participation, drawing from her background in the visual, performing, and media arts.

Originally from New York City, she received master's degrees from M.I.T. and from the Massachusetts College of Art and Design. Baird is a member of the inclusive FeministFuturist artists collective and currently has a commissioned long-term installation in the lobby of the MassArt Art Museum (MAAM) in Boston.

Node Hissed offers a gesture, a pulling of plant-life toward a human-made center, a confluence of materials, intentions, and energies. It presents a focus for considering that the natural and the synthetic exist in inextricably overlapping physical and cultural spaces.

FRED X. BROWNSTEIN

Fred X. Brownstein creates contemporary figurative sculpture in marble and bronze. He lived and worked in Italy for 16 years prior to moving to Vermont. During his time in Italy, he was an apprentice in the sculpture studio of Enzo Pasquini in Querceta, Italy for four years (1976–1980), learning the traditional Italian techniques for marble sculpture. Fred also worked in several of the bronze foundries in Pietrasanta, learning the methods involved in casting and finishing bronze sculpture.

All of Fred's sculpture is first created in clay, then molded and cast in plaster. The plaster sculpture serves as a model for either a final version in marble or bronze.

Fred is a Fellow member of the National Sculpture Society and a professional member of the Stone Carvers Guild.



JOE CHIRCHIRILLO

Joe Chirchirillo has been creating sculpture since the early 1970s. He settled in Jersey City, New Jersey in 1979 as part of the first wave of artists moving to this outpost across the Hudson, building the budding art scene there. In the early 1980s he was involved with artists from lower Manhattan and Brooklyn who were putting on large shows in abandoned buildings and blighted urban lots. At that time, Chirchirillo's work was reviewed in *Art Forum, Art in America, Vanity Fair* and on numerous occasions in the *New York Times*.

He moved to Vermont 20 years ago. Since then, he has focused on creating outdoor sculpture: "Over the course of my career I have been concerned with creating work that is drawn from elements found in nature and the mechanical world."

Chirchirillo has been the curator of The North Bennington (VT) Outdoor Sculpture Show (NBOSS) for the last 13 years. The show attracts thousands of viewers each year.

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WALTER CLARK

Boston-based sculptor Walter Clark creates his art at Stonybrook Metal Arts and Sculpture School, in Jamaica Plain, MA, where he also works. Clark works in many media, creating pieces as varied as African masks, abstract and representative steel sculptures, watercolor paintings, steel furniture, and pencil drawings. He finds his inspiration from God, his African heritage, and his "particular temperament."

Clark has been exhibiting for more than 20 years in the Greater Boston area.

JOSÉ CRIOLLO

José Criollo, a native of Ecuador, now lives and works in Worcester, MA. His work explores themes of identity, movement, and how people adapt to new places. *Fauna Urbana* is a sculpture of a deer made entirely from recycled materials.

"It represents how nature survives in cities, often quietly and unnoticed — just like many of us who are far from home. By using discarded objects, I give new life to things that were once forgotten, much like I've had to rebuild myself in a new country. The deer stands as a symbol of resilience, alert and present in the middle of the city. As an artist, I believe it's important to care for nature — and through my work, I try to give trash a second chance."

JOSIE CAMPBELL DELLENBAUGH

Balancing Act — First Steps is the fourth in a series of sculptures by Josie Dellenbaugh depicting the challenges faced in today's world. "Babies are just learning to navigate their precarious environment and have much to master."

Dellenbaugh's work has been part of many solo and juried exhibitions domestically and internationally. She is a member of the National Association of Women Artists, CT Women Artists, Society of CT Sculptors, and The New England Sculptors Association. She has won numerous awards. In 2017, she was awarded the Gibbons Prize for Excellence in Sculpture by the New England Sculptors Association and in 2022 took first place in their Equinox Exhibition. Josie's work in is many private collections as well as publicly owned. She is also regularly included in sculpture walks throughout the country. See her website for a complete listing.

CASSIE DOYON

Cassie Doyon's interest in mosaics was originally sparked by her fascination with the coming together of disparate elements. She uses a wide variety of materials in her work, including natural, foraged and found items such as sea glass, bone, driftwood and stone. Her use of color is widely variable, from muted and earth toned to vivid hues. "Where mosaic work tends to be structured and planned, I try to incorporate spontaneity and serendipity within my pieces. I am particularly focused on surface design and pushing the boundaries of sculpture with unconventional and re-purposed materials."

Much of Doyon's artwork is abstract in style and form, reflecting her lifelong interest in tribal art and artifacts from around the world. Born and raised in a seaside town, the ocean has been a powerful, repetitive theme through most of her art. "With color and texture, I like to create memories of places I've visited over the years, and to explore macro and micro-environments in nature."

KEVIN DUFFY

Kevin Duffy's education and early career focused primarily on painting and Illustration. A number of years ago, he began working as a Monument Conservator. This line of work, rekindled a long dormant desire to carve stone.

"The process and challenges involved in shaping stone, have been both very fulfilling and influential in my creative development. I usually begin the process, with drawings or a small scale model.

"As material is removed, I begin to excavate many unforeseen variables of form, volume, texture, and color. These powerful variables often help guide the development and outcome of my work."

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WESTY EGMONT

Westy Egmont is a native of Brooklyn, NY and has been a professor at Global Practice, Immigrant Integration, at Boston College SSW after leading the International Institute of New England.

"The draw of the aesthetic life continually drew me to the arts and the realm of visual universal communication. Under the tutelage of Morris Norvin (MFA) and later Nora Vadez (Carving Studio) I sought forms that speak for themselves through the world of sculpture, especially figurative art. At my Studio in Humphrey Street Studios in Dorchester, MA, I benefit from a wonderful community of 40+ artists and artisans. Art can also have humor, a welcome refracting mirror in serious times.

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SHAWN FARRELL

Shawn Farrell, a professional member of the New England Sculptors Association, received a BFA from Hartwick College, specializing in glassblowing and bronze foundry. He began his career by honing his techniques on the West Coast, working for artists from Alaska to Mexico. After mastering his craft, he moved to the East Coast and now makes mostly large-scale works for public spaces. Shawn is inspired by forms in nature and how shapes interact with each other. His work can be seen in galleries, parks, museums, and private collections. He prefers not to limit himself to one medium but finds himself continually drawn to working with glass and metal.

KRIS FRANCIS

Kris Francis, a recycled metal artist from Gloucester, Massachusetts, has spent more than 13 years transforming scrap into captivating sculptures. Formerly a mason, Kris's artistic journey began when he spotted discarded horseshoes at a local barn. He immediately saw potential where others saw waste. That moment sparked a passion for turning reclaimed materials such as chains, boat parts, motorcycle components, and old tools into unique works of art. From intricate table top pieces to life-size animal sculptures, Kris focuses on capturing the character and movement of each subject. His life-size works often serve as memorials or tributes. conveying the spirit and strength of animals and nature with raw industrial beauty.

CHRIS FROEHLICH

Chris Froehlich has been drawing, painting, and sculpting all of his life, but it wasn't until high school that he learned to draw and sculpt with an awareness of conceptual space. His sculptures and paintings have been exhibited in Connecticut, the Hudson Valley, Massachusetts, and Vermont.

"My sculptures come from what was once a living entity; what's left is the structure or the skeleton with its vibrational memories of its history, growth patterns, and invasions. It was then arrested in its de-composing process by me so that I could tell a story using its structure.

"To me, trees are beings that are intrinsically tied and connected to the planet and we humans. The full range of human emotions and structures can be seen and reflected in trees. Trees reconnect us to the earth and the realms below the surface as they emerge and embrace the sky and the sun. A metaphor for the complete human and a balanced planet."

CINDY GORDON

Cindy Gordon was born and raised in a small town on the coast of New England, where her surroundings inspire her work. "My ancestors are from a small Azorean Island and they thrived by the grace of the ocean. This strong connection to the comfort and monumentality of the ocean is a prominent thread in my work."

"I am increasingly concerned with the fragility of our planet and its future. I try to depict the beautiful, delicate, and subtle qualities of my surroundings through my sculptures in hopes it will

help others to appreciate all that nature provides us."

Guard was hand-built; then carved to reveal a hand-built wave nestled within. "This sculpture embodies my relationship to the ocean and how it has shaped my identity personally and maternally. Weathered and worn by the ebb and flow of the ocean, it remains loyal while guarding."

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JOSEPH GRAY

For more than 40 years, Joseph Gray has been creating art out of stone. His sculptures are exhibited frequently in New England art galleries, sculpture gardens, and other outdoor gathering spaces. He was commissioned to install sculpture on the Clipper Trail in Newburyport, MA. The city subsequently purchased his signature piece, *Dance Me to*

the End of Time, previously on exhibit at Maudslay State Park in Newburyport, MA. Two additional sculptures of his are now installed on the trail. His work is also displayed at the Alnobal property in Kensington, NH and at the historic Nestlenook Farm in Jackson, NH.

Gray was invited to showcase his sculpture and stonework for the opening exhibits at the 2014, 2016, 2017, 2019, and 2020 Boston Flower & Garden Show. He has created large outdoor hardscape projects in Salt Lake City, around New England, in Florida, and in the UK.

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MICHAEL KING

Michael King lives and creates art in the Berkshires

"Psychoneurolinguistics. Although funny to look at on a typed page, it's been a rainmaker of a word for me for years. I love unexpected encounters in a world where the mundane and profane actively mingle with the profound. Where the initially disenchanting nature of lifeless raw materials can be transformed into something that is quietly seductive and elegantly thought-provoking."

GINTS GRINBERGS

Gints Grinbergs says that his creative process has two distinct halves — collecting and design. "As a lifelong packrat, I have always enjoyed the collecting process, be it exploring barn sales and junk shops throughout New England or sneaking into scrap yards around Boston." Lately, Grinbergs has been buying industrial discards from fabrication shops and trying to find an alternative life for these laser cut castoffs. In the disposable world we live in, he strives to make things useful. Maybe this all comes from his training as an architect.

"My relationship with my design process is a bit more complex. It can be instantaneous — I'll see the perfect parts for a sculpture scattered at my feet — or it can get laborious. I find nothing more agonizing than the equivalent of writer's block!"

Grinbergs attempts to transform and upcycle manmade materials into the infinitely more complex forms designed by nature. He works intuitively — with no drawing or sketching beforehand. "I enjoy working directly with materials — seeing which parts work best together."

Cracked Planet addresses the artist's concerns for the environment and our world in general.

JAMES KITCHEN

Living and working in western
Massachusetts, James Kitchen has been
welding metal into sculptures since the '90s,
though before that he expressed his creativity
through music, poetry, stone carving and
painting. His band, James Kitchen & the
Appliances, is still a crowd pleaser!

As for his sculptures, "Each piece arises from an intuition that, over the years, I have learned to trust. I am a voracious reader and take long walks each day. I observe, think, and allow everything experienced to coalesce when welding my creations.

"Rescuing time-worn pieces of metal, once tools or ancient machinery, but now found discarded, is a passion of mine. Animating

cold lifeless scraps and instilling a personality or creating an emotional response when viewed by others is a magical process that I am unable to articulate. I am a clumsy magician."

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ELIZABETH KNOWLES

Natural patterns inspire Elizabeth Knowles's work. Some are biological patterns at the cellular level of organisms. Others are geological patterns found in the earth's natural landscapes. Working with a variety of media in three dimensions, she explores the "dynamic interplay between the landscape and life forms, between physiology and physics, between the cycles of life and decay, and between growth and form."

"My creative process becomes a re-creation of the interaction of different levels of life. One basic strand of wire sequentially connects to twist with another strand of wire, and another,

and another until a whole is created. This action mirrors how cells group together to form more intricate organisms. Each shape is a complete entity yet simultaneously connecting to a greater system of patterns."

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WENDY KLEMPERER

The imagery that pervades Wendy Klemperer's work reflects her lifelong fascination with animals. To make the large scale sculptures she searches scrap yards for industrial refuse ravaged by usage and demolition.

"Bent and twisted, such pieces contain energy and potential new life. My welding process is a kind of three-dimensional gesture drawing. With a network of steel nails, I build skeletal forms containing both presence and absence. I investigate the body language of animals to express a feeling or state of being, with motion conveying emotion. Focusing on the animal realm — probing the relationship between all forms of life on earth — seems no less important to me than the human aspect alone."

The pieces in this installation began as drawings and sculptures that Wendy photographed and projected onto steel plates. "I trace and hand-cut each form using a plasma cutter. Sited at the forest edge, the silhouettes evoke a threshold between reality and fantasy — an imaginative, alternate world inhabited by creatures of memory, instinct, and dream.

ILANA KREPCHIN

Ilana Krepchin, a member of the New England Sculptors Association, earned her BA from Hampshire College in Photography and Anthropology before training extensively in jewelry making at places such as the DeCordova Museum and Metalwerx. When the pandemic hit, she took advantage of the free time to explore making her small jewelry sculptures into large standing works.

"I've always been drawn to geometric shapes and fractals — like the Golden Ratio and The Fibonacci sequence. They are pleasing to the eye but also make the viewer consider how the universe works; why are these structures found all over the natural world? The use of motion also allows viewers to interact with the sculptures, asking them to reflect on the inter-

connectivity of art and light, materials and maker, and the nature of the fractals."

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JAMES MEYER

James Meyer, born of Mexican heritage, is an indigenous North American artist. Adopted in Lynwood, California in 1962, he moved to the East Coast with his family in 1967. By then, he was already drawing and painting. In the early '80s, he attended the School of Visual arts in New York City and became the studio assistant to Jasper Johns in 1985.

Meyer has exhibited his work throughout the Northeast since the early '80s, including at the Marc Strauss Gallery in Manhattan in 2022. He has lived in Connecticut since the mid '90s. With his wife and other artists in the

MARIN MURAKOSHI

Marin Murakoshi grew up in one of the oldest small villages of Ishigaki island, Okinawa, Japan. Her sculptures capture the emotions, questions, and wonders of life's fleeting moments in the hope of inspiring viewers to gently encourage the strength to live. She often creates forms through a dialogue with natural materials, relating them to mythology and folklore. She adds a touch of whimsy and humor to her work. Before moving to Boston in 2016, she lived in Osaka, New York, Los Angeles, and Seattle.

"One day, I found a handful of bamboo through Freecycle and thought about using them for the next art project. As I looked at the bamboo poles for a while, porcupine quills came to mind. Then a friend gave me a piece of oak tree and I decided to give shape to my vision by combining two materials.

"Porcupines symbolize resilience, self-protection, and the ability to defend against negative energies. The porcupine also represents honesty, reliability, and the courage to speak one's truth.

"Are these qualities becoming more necessary than ever for all of us who live in troubled situations where the future is difficult to see? During the pandemic, I found myself thinking daily about anxiety and stress and maintaining a sense of calm. No matter the situation, resilience and staying calm allows us to find the courage to envision a better future and take action accordingly in our community and beyond."

PINGREE RAKU COLLABORATIVE **SCULPTURE**

This collaborative sculpture is the product of Pingree School's first afterschool Raku Ceramics program in which students explored handbuilding, wheel-throwing, glazing, and the intense yet beautiful reduction-based firing process. Each student crafted a hollow ceramic cube made from slabs of grogged Raku clay, featuring designs and images that hold personal meaning. Symbols include a bird, a skier, an eye, and a tree. The pieces were sculpted utilizing the slab technique with students experimenting freely with underglaze and glaze combinations to create one-of-a-kind surfaces. Students chose a letter from the phrase "Pingree Raku," connecting the individual blocks into a unified artistic expression.

Once bisque-fired and glazed, the cubes were rocketed to 1800 degrees, removed from the Raku kiln while still glowing red, and placed in barrels filled with combustible materials including newspaper, sawdust, and leaves to create an unpredictable array of surface effects. Possessing strategically placed holes, the finished blocks were stacked onto two vertical metal rods — one for each word — that displays the students' shared identity.

It serves as a tribute to Pingree's diverse students, their unique skills in curiosity and craftsmanship, as well as the limitless, powerful possibilities that emerge when they create alongside each other.

Caron Tabb was born in apartheid South Africa, raised on a farm in Israel from the age of eight, and has lived in the US for the last 20 years.

"My conceptual mixed-media and installation pieces address issues of identity, social inequality, racial justice and feminism as seen through the lens of my Jewish identity and personal history as an immigrant...! seek out materials rife with metaphor, such as Jewish ritualistic objects, fencing materials, and repurposed garments.

Inspired by the Tibetan prayer flag tradition, Eighteen Flags of Compassion draws on

hanging small, colorful flags outdoors, which are believed to carry prayers and mantras through the wind, spreading compassion and goodwill into the surrounding space.

Each flag in this installation is marked with the Hebrew word "chessed," which translates to "compassion." By blending these two cultural traditions, the work invites reflection on the universal values of empathy and kindness. In Jewish tradition, the number 18 holds significant spiritual and symbolic meaning; it is associated with the Hebrew word "chai" ('ח'), which means "life," and is a symbol of life, luck, and blessings. .

After volunteering at Andres Institute of Art, self-taught sculptor Keith Trexler was inspired to try carving discarded chunks of granite buried in the woods of his backyard. His work is primitive, modeled on ancient cultures, paleontology, nature and neolithic carvings, evoking a time when stone idols had power to spark imagination and wonder.

"Trojan Horse highlights the loss of women's freedom and body-autonomy through the policies of predominantly male politicians who are here represented by an oversized sperm cell bringing chains and shackles in its wake. The chains and shackles convey this loss of body-autonomy for women, powerfully conveying that without the choice to put a woman's own reproductive health and well-being first, a pregnancy may cause her pain, leave her in poverty, or cause her death."


